## Dear Friends of Oak Grove Montessori School,

So, I decided to take a stroll across the campus at Oak Grove Montessori School to give me inspiration for this message to everyone about the school year 2021/22. Today is the Ides of March and is the second anniversary of the pandemic. What a myriad of things we have experienced, learned, cried over and fought against during such a hard time in the history of humanity. After working in 13 schools in 10 countries I truly feel that coming to the Grove and working with the teachers and watching the students learn in a traditional,

intentional, loving Montessori setting has to be the pinnacle of my 37 years in education.

What students learn at Oak Grove are the skills necessary to be successful not only in school but also in life. Every student is on a different page at the same time. They are all working on student-centered projects based on their interests and their needs. Combine this with gentle yet consistent guidance from the dedicated faculty who spend countless hours preparing the classroom for continuous successes throughout the day, month, year — until our students graduate and go on.

Standing in the middle of the forest and looking over at the campus across the vernal pond I see the bright, shining beacon of hope known as Oak Grove which represents to me not an alternative to education but the imperative for education and I only hope that such amazing learning experiences can be replicated in other schools across the world because every child deserves the finest education and that is found at Oak Grove Montessori School.

The gathering spot by the red oak in the forest reminds me of a park ranger's amphitheater in a national forest. Moving down to the vernal pond shows the juxtaposition of land and water where life is rich in abundance and easily studied by our Owls right in our backyard. Walking by a baby white pine recently planted shows hope springing eternal as a new member of the forest has been tended by the students and a sign posted to show respect for what is bound to become a thriving tree amongst all of her friends here. On my way out of the forest I pass a large maple in and think of the sweet sap beneath her bark that nourishes us if we decide to borrow some.



Across the footbridge I enter the trimmed yard walking up to Seth Brody's Orchard, a painting of which is also hanging in my office and the plaque reads: *In loving memory of Seth Brody* — *Class of 2018* — *Seth Brody Memorial Scholarship Fund* — *Established 2019*. This orchard is a very special place and we are honored to be the caretakers in remembrance of his time at the Grove and his love for nature and especially Gala apples.

Crossing the soccer field, I'm flanked by the Primary play area to my left and the Lower and Upper Elementary play area to my right, while moving on towards the outdoor gardens, the glorious greenhouse and Piper and his friends at Yolk Grove. Walking across the main playfield I notice students sitting outside enjoying the sun. The pavilion is an inviting space to sit at a picnic table and read a book or watch the student's playing basketball on the court or lying on the grass enjoying Mother Nature at her finest at the Grove.

We truly need your support to continue for yet another 40 years as we have already done so for the past 40. 

## Profile

I graduated from the University of Rhode Island last spring (2021), with degrees in Aquaculture & Fisheries Science and Biological Science. Now some may read this and ask, what is aquaculture? Aquaculture is farming, but in the water, and my goal is to eventually start my own ocean farming operation; I plan to sustainably grow crops such as oysters, scallops, mussels, and kelp, right here in New England, providing locally sourced food for the community, while also cleaning the water and helping the environment. After wrapping up my time in college, I find myself in an animal research lab at Yale University, where I take care of thousands of frogs used in clinical research. These amphibious Xenopus tropicalis frogs are used as models for the study of birth defects in human children, and through this research, doctors can better understand what specific DNA sequences can cause these often detrimental life-long genetic diseases. As far as down time goes I'm an avid scuba diver, a hobby I picked up by taking scuba classes at URI. I enjoy fishing too, and in winter I try to go snowboarding as often as I'm able.

## If you could change anything in the world, what would you change?

Reducing greenhouse gas emissions, as well as binding more atmospheric carbon dioxide and stopping ocean acidification, should be the primary objectives of every true world citizen. If we harness the power of the ocean, we can feed our people through sustainable aquaculture practices that actively contribute to reversing the harm that's already been done to our planet.

## What habits, skills, and character qualities do you trace directly back to your time at OGMS?

My time at Oak Grove was life changing. As a kid who personally struggled to even learn how to read, the much smaller class sizes allowed me to get the personal help that I needed to excel early on, until eventually I was reading well above my grade level. I remember even the methods by which I was taught math, with physical or visual aids to represent the numbers in the problems, were a great aid to my established staff members not just as teachers, but as friends that could be directly approached with any issues and confided in. I always found that the freedom given to the teachers at Oak Grove allowed for more creativity on their part, resulting in more creativity from students as we navigated our own way through the curriculum with our teacher's gentle and often subtle guidance. Oak Grove taught me to never be afraid to be yourself, and to always ask pertinent questions.

"Transitioning out of Oak Grove into a public middle school was certainly jarring in some respects, but my time there allowed me to easily navigate the rough waters that are the public school system once I arrived. At Oak Grove, cooperation was always a ruling principle, and the ability to get along with others through a myriad of different situations is something I can absolutely attribute to my time there."

## How does the mission and philosophy (Respect, Independence, Engagement) of OGMS still guide you today?

Oak Grove has always been a place where no one has to be afraid of expressing themselves. There is a mutual trust and respect between the teachers and students that I have not experienced at a school since, which stems directly from the personal connections that teachers are able to build with each and every one of their students. Oak Grove instilled in me a strong will, and a desire to serve the world in some way. I found myself looking for that way forward to serve before I even knew what it meant, and after moving on from Oak Grove I continued to connect my interests to that desire until I settled on restorative ocean farming as my answer.

#### What defines the OGMS experience?

At Oak Grove, we are all a part of one family; everybody knows everybody else, and it's a community all its own. It's the place where I grew up. It's the place where I made a miniature solar powered boat because, why not? It's where I learned how to sing. Oak Grove is the first place that I cared for an aquarium tank: first a reef tank, then a painted turtle. The experiences I had at Oak Grove are ones that I never would have had at a public school, both due to the scale of operation, and the flexibility of curriculum, and I think without my time there I would have been a drastically different person, I cannot recommend the Montessori Method enough.

## Profile

To this day, I credit Oak Grove with instilling in me a deep love for learning, a strong sense of creativity and independence in the classroom, and an appreciation for community and collaboration. I cherish the qualities that Oak Grove encouraged in me and believe that without that fostering I wouldn't be the student or person I am today. I also always think of the creative writing curriculum at Oak Grove as being central to my love for writing that persists even now!

"I spent the first twelve years of my life in Montessori environments, and five of those years at Oak Grove, so adjusting to an entirely different way of learning, in addition to the typical social and environmental adjustments, was disorienting when I first started at a new school. Soon though, I found that the curiosity, kindness, and sense of self that my Montessori experience fostered in me were real advantages in a new school. I certainly attribute my ability to connect with my peers and my teachers in middle and high school to the emphasis at Oak Grove placed on community respect and interpersonal relationship building."

## How does the mission and philosophy of OGMS still guide you today?

I think the OGMS mission and philosophy are big parts of how I think about myself within the world. Oak Grove taught me to extend grace and respect toward the planet and all people, to be confident and independent in my thinking, and to engage with issues and causes that matter to me. Guiding principles in my life as a student, the OGMS mission and philosophy are also beginning to take on greater significance for me as I think about possible career paths.


#### What defines the OGMS experience?

In my memory, the OGMS experience is about allowing students to be unapologetically themselves and about offering an education that trusts, respects and celebrates the individual as much as it does the cocreated classroom communities. Elements of the OGMS curriculum that stick out in my mind as being particularly definitive are the storytelling workshops, senior projects, and field trips. All of these experiences challenged me as a student, stretched my imagination, and brought my peers and me closer together in the learning process.

## The Collaboratory

Outside of the Oak Grove main building is a wonderful space, with a plaque dedicated on Earth Day 2006, to all those who made it possible: the South Windham Post and Beam Co., O.L. Willard Co., Goods and Services Auction Committee 2005, Auction Donors, and the Oak Grove Building Committee. I'm referring to the post and beam Pavilion that has stood proudly for the past 14 years on campus as a gathering space whenever the weather was agreeable.

It's now time to take the Pavilion to the next level. We have decided to re-purpose the space as an all-season facility. The space will include a movable wall which doubles as the theatre proscenium, double doors on both ends and tool benches along the back wall. With these upgrades we can use the Pavilion as:

- 1. A dedicated classroom for art, dance, drama and music classes including performances.
- 2. A maker space for project-based learning including tools and workbenches.
- 3. A gathering space for all OGMS community members to enjoy all year round.

We formally introduced this expansion concept at our Gala 2020. To kickoff the project we needed a new name and came up with the idea of The Henry Collaboratory, in honor of the over two decades of dedication and hard work from Cindy and Joe Henry. At the Gala we raised enough funds to kick-off the project using Raise Your Bid! donations.

The week after the Gala we took delivery of the new Toolarium, an 8 x 10 foot solid wood shed for storage of tools, etc., from the Jamaica Cottage Shop, South Londonderry, VT. Last week we installed electric conduit for 30 amp service out to the Toolarium. The project is now well underway.

Now we need to continue the efforts to keep moving forward. Your kind donations will go a long way to keeping the dream alive at the Grove for another 40 years.




